ARTICULATION AGREEMENT

Hardin-Simmons University proposes to accept academic courses from Midland College toward the bachelor degrees as outlined in the following. This proposal is designed to clarify and encourage students as they plan to transfer from Midland College to Hardin-Simmons University.

The following general policies apply to work being transferred to Hardin-Simmons University:

- A. Up to 66 hours of course work from a two-year institution (i.e. Midland College) may be accepted in transfer to Hardin-Simmons University.
- B. Final acceptance of all transfer work is subject to the Registrar, who is the articulation officer for the university.
- C. An official copy of all transcripts must be submitted to HSU.
- D. Hardin-Simmons University does not grant credit for experiential learning or professional certificates.
- E. Freshman and sophomore-level courses will not transfer as upper-division credit.
- F. Freshman and sophomore-level courses may not substitute for upper-division courses unless approved by the head of the department of the area in which the course is offered or by the appropriate dean.
- G. Courses with grades lower than a C will not be accepted in transfer. However, at the time of admission, a student may petition to transfer no more than two courses with grades of D, providing the resulting overall transfer GPA is 2.0 or higher.
- H. An Evaluation Form, which indicates the transfer status of all courses attempted, will be provided to the applicant usually within three weeks after the receipt of all official transcripts.

Note: Students who would like to be enrolled concurrently at Midland College and Hardin-Simmons University will need special consortial permission for financial aid purposes.

FOREIGN LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS for BA, BM, and BFA degrees:

Bachelor of Arts degrees require two years (12 credits) of one language.

Bachelor of Arts in Music Business requires three semesters (9 credits) in one language.

Bachelor of Fine Arts degrees requires one year (6 credits) of one language.

Bachelor of Music degrees, excluding the **Bachelor of Music Education** degree, usually require one semester (3 credits) of French and one semester (3 credits) of German. However, some majors may vary.

NOTE: PSYC 2314 Life Span Growth and Development will transfer as the HSU course, PSYC 2300 Life Span Development, but the course will not count towards the major. For psychology majors this course will count as an elective. The Life Span course *will* count towards a minor in psychology.

Additional HSU Coursework: In addition to the 12 hours identified above, the following courses will be required to complete the requirements for a major in Psychology.

PSYC 3303 Abnormal Psychology

PSYC 3308 Introduction to Research Methods

PSYC 4335 History, Systems, and Philosophy of Psychology (taken in the spring semester prior to graduation)

Four additional upper level PSYC courses (12 hours of electives within the major).

Prerequisites and Course Sequence: PSYC 3308 must be taken before a student can enroll in PSYC 3309 Advanced Research Methods and PSYC 4101, 4102, & 4103 Directed Research. For all other PSYC courses, PSYC 1301 is the only prerequisite. Students planning to take the additional research courses should take PSYC 3308 in their first spring or summer terms at HSU.

Preparation for Graduate School: Students should explore career pathways and corresponding graduate programs before or during the first semester of their junior year. Many graduate programs have specific courses that must be taken for admission into the program. Students can select courses for their major and electives that meet the admission requirements for the graduate programs they plan to pursue.

HSU Clinical Counseling and Marriage & Family Therapy Program (CCMF): The CCMF graduate program enables students to obtain the education and training required to become a Licensed Professional Counselor and/or Licensed Marriage & Family Therapist. The program is nationally accredited through CACREP. The degree includes curriculum and clinical experiences that prepare students for a wide range of professional opportunities. Graduates of the program work in a variety of positions such as



private practice therapists, in substance abuse programs, as registered play therapists, at mental health facilities, in religious settings, and in all types of organizations both for-profit and nonprofit. The CCMF coursework and internship programs are designed to help students to explore and specialize in their areas of professional interest. Undergraduate students who meet the academic standards for admission into the CCMF program can apply for early admission at the end of their junior year. Early admission students can take CCMF courses while finishing up their undergraduate degree requirements.
