

ON THE COVER

This illustration attempts to weave a tapestry of divine and human artistry—like a glimpse into God's sketchbook for creation. Hidden in the background is the Word of the Lord, through which all creation was made. It expands into the elements that compose our universe, geometrically and mathematically structured into the world of life and beauty we see around us.

From the elements and compounds that make up all matter to the vast expanse of the galaxy, God has formed chemical compounds into DNA, into cells, into plants, animals, and mankind. Each of these is ordered within the pages of the sketchbook.

God's created order is represented by the "golden ratio," subtly worked into the design, hidden within much of creation, mathematics, music, art, and architecture.

What is TRUTH?

Philosophy defines truth as an objective, verifiable reality that can be proven valid. However, as Christians, we know that truth is not just an idea or a fact; it's a person.

"So Pilate entered his headquarters again and called Jesus and said to him, 'Are you the King of the Jews?' Jesus answered, 'Do you say this of your own accord, or did others say it to you about me?' Pilate answered, 'Am I a Jew? Your own nation and the chief priests have delivered you over to me. What have you done?' Jesus answered, 'My kingdom is not of this world. If my kingdom were of this world, my servants would have been fighting, that I might not be delivered over to the Jews. But my kingdom is not from the world." Then Pilate said to him, 'So you are a king?' Jesus answered, 'You say that I am a king. For this purpose I was born and for this purpose I have come into the world-to bear witness to the truth. Everyone who is of the truth listens to my voice.' Pilate said to him, 'What is truth?""

— John 18:33–38

Truth is objective and universal. What is true is valid for all people at all times in all places, whether they know it or not, believe it or not, and like it or not. In an age that downplays truth, knowledge, and religion, Hardin-Simmons' call is to stand firm as a beacon for education and Christ.

What is **BEAUTY**?

Great art is inspiring. The purple hues of a sunset, the sculpture of a live oak tree, the majesty of the Big Bend, the synergy of music joined with ballet in Aaron Copland's and Martha Graham's *Appalachian Spring*, Michelangelo's sculpture of *David*, the exquisite paintings of water lilies by Claude Monet, the power of film in *To Kill a Mockingbird*—These were all inspired by truth and beauty as they depict stories of the triumph and tragedy of the human spirit.

In contrast to the idea of truth, beauty is seemingly less tangible and more difficult to define objectively. As Confucius famously stated, "Everything has beauty, but not everyone sees it," or in modern terms - beauty is in the eye of the beholder. No doubt, beauty is a more relativistic concept in comparison to facts or the hard sciences. However, none can deny that beauty exists and that some things are more beautiful than others: the Swiss Alps vs. a trash heap, the *Mona Lisa* vs. a kindergarten diorama, etc. Hence, there is an objective truth undergirding the premise of beauty.

God brought forth creation. Humanity has the privilege of living in a beautiful, amazing world. God dwells in beauty. As Christians, we know that the objective beauty of creation reflects the glory of God and points towards transcendent truths. Psalm 50:2 states: "From Zion, perfect in beauty, God shines forth."



How do TRUTH & BEAUTY relate and intersect?

As academics, we are often stirred by and find joy in the inherent truth and beauty of our respective disciplines. For the mathematician, it is the symmetry and repetitive logic of numerical relationships and proofs; for the artist, it is the intertwined aesthetic of color, shape, symmetry, and design; for the physician, it is the efficiency, utility, and complex design of the human body.

Furthermore, as educators, we have the great privilege and responsibility of passing the torch of this inspiration and knowledge to the next generation.

But perhaps most importantly, as Christians, we know that the existence of both truth and beauty is not by chance or mere happy accident. Both originate from and find their true meaning in their Creator. Moreover, they are not separate entities but intertwined aspects of God's general revelation in creation.

"For by Him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities—all things were created through Him and for Him. And He is before all things, and in Him all things hold together."

COLLEGE of ARTS

The mission of the College of Arts and Media (CAM) is to train student-artists in the disciplines of art, communication, music, and theatre to imagine, create, perform, and present their artistry through the lens of a Christian Worldview. God, the Creator, the eternal artist, has endowed His creation with the ability to create. God made us in His image; it is only fitting to worship Him by employing these exquisite gifts. The arts are one of the greatest gifts of God to encourage the believer, enrich human life, and communicate the Gospel.

Humanity is a work of art created by and reliant upon God. The incorporation of faith into the classroom is realized through studying, composing, and presenting great musical compositions, performing profound stage works, drawing, painting, and sculpting new works of art, and harnessing strategic communication and media technology to communicate truth. In teaching student-artists the importance of communicating truth and beauty, CAM prepares students to share their artistic expression with the world which is in dire need of truth and beauty.

As HSU students graduate and enter their careers, they will be prepared not only academically but also, through their education enlightened by faith to stand strong on their convictions. In doing so, they will be able to find other artists who share their Christian worldview thus encouraging one another to do good works. The world is not always respectful of what they, as artists, want to communicate but their voices speaking truth and beauty must be heard.

As the Dean of this College, I find it an immense joy to work with the School of Music and the Departments of Art, Communication, and Theatre. What a privilege to witness student-artists grow in their artistic abilities during their academic study. Splendid work is happening in CAM in vocal and instrumental recitals; choral, ensemble, band, and orchestra concerts; musicals, plays, set and stage designs; art shows, painting, sculpture, photography, and graphic design; strategic communication and digital media; art education, music education, and theatre education. God is bringing together a talented group of faculty, staff, and student artists in the College of Arts and Media for such a time as this.

CYNTHIA ANN PARKER COLLEGE of LIBERAL ARTS

s a dean and faculty member at HSU, one of my goals is to help students better understand the reality of our world and the reality of God by effectively pursuing truth.

Students taking courses in HSU's Cynthia Ann Parker College of Liberal Arts improve their ability to think critically, reason constructively, communicate clearly, and interact effectively with other people. My goal is for HSU students to develop an attitude of lifelong learning by adopting an attitude of curiosity, skepticism, and humility (Myers & DeWall, 2023). It is crucial that this attitudinal approach for students is based on a desire to glorify God and minister to others for the rest of their lives.

Many people, like Pontius Pilate, have asked the question, "What is truth?" (John 18:38), with Jesus noting earlier to his disciples, "I am the way and the truth and the life..." (John 14:6). I believe a crucial role of university education is helping people understand truth, i.e., learning to distinguish more effectively what is accurate and genuine from what is false, misleading, or deceptive.

"But the wisdom that comes from heaven is first of all pure; then peace-loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere." James 3:17

As a Christian, I believe similarly to Eric Johnson (2010) that "wisdom entails a paradox: the wiser we become, the more aware we become of our lack of wisdom and our need for the help of others. 'The way of a fool seems right to him, but a wise man listens to advice' (Prov 12:15)" (p. 293). Johnson continued to note that "the goal of any science is the increasingly comprehensive conformity of our understanding to God's absolutely comprehensive understanding or, as some have said, 'to think God's thoughts after him" (p. 293). However, we have to approach this goal with humility, because in contrast to God's perfect understanding, "our [understanding] is necessarily limited at best. We must confess with the apostle Paul that 'we see but a poor reflection in the mirror' (I Cor 13:12)" (p. 293).

I believe each of us has a calling to serve God and minister in particular ways during our time on earth. I see each student in my class through this lens of God's purpose and calling, knowing that their time at HSU can be crucial in learning how best to partner with God to minister to the world. As a faculty member and dean, one of my most important roles is to help students better understand this sense of calling and purpose within God's plan for their lives.

It is exciting to see how completing a college education opens doors for HSU students so they are better able to follow their sense of calling as children of God.

HOLLAND SCHOOL of SCIENCES රං MATHEMATICS

A s the STEM college, many might consider us the most removed from disciplines or fields that intersect with Christian ideas or principles. On the contrary, it is the scientists and mathematicians of the world that reveal God through his natural revelation. When we study God's creation and His natural law, we see God's attributes on display – omnipotent power, infinitude, sovereignty, etc.

"The more I study nature, the more I stand amazed at the work of the Creator. Science brings men nearer to God." —Louis Pasteur

On a more practical level, we are preparing our students not only to be outstanding professionals in their chosen fields but also to be citizens and ambassadors of God's kingdom. We strive to empower them to not only have knowledge and skills but to know how to use those tools to make a difference in people's lives and impact God's creation. To give a few examples, some of our faculty have separate scripture passages they read for each different section topic in their course. In all STEM disciplines, ethical considerations are of prime importance, and these conversations give opportunities to discuss with students how a Christian's ethics/integrity in the workplace may be different (or at least have a different foundation) than the world.

In Holland School of Sciences and Mathematics, we believe truth isn't defined; it is discovered. This is because, ultimately, all truth comes from God and is eternal and unchanging. Knowledge evolves over time because our understanding of God's revelation is sometimes incomplete or misinterpreted. For example, for most of human history man had a limited and incorrect understanding of planetary motion. It wasn't until the Copernican Revolution in the 16th and 17th centuries that we developed an understanding of heliocentrism. What we once regarded as fact was not actually true. The scientists, mathematicians, and engineers of the world continue to push the boundaries of knowledge and discover God's truth in creation.

While we in STEM are sometimes stereotyped as strictly left-brained, analytical robots, we often relish the art and beauty of our work. The same Creator who precisely defined the mathematical constants and physical laws upholding our universe also paints sunsets and sculpts the majestic Matterhorn.

"For since the creation of the world His invisible attributes, His eternal power and divine nature, have been clearly seen, being understood through what has been made, so that they are without excuse." Romans 1:20

Joy comes from seeing students learn and succeed. Success can occur daily, per semester, or, ultimately, at graduation. Learning happens every day. Our joy as teachers in KCOBPS is amplified when we read or hear about our students achieving success in their careers and professions. Beauty comes from watching students develop their knowledge and skills while following the trajectory of the known to the unknown and the concrete to the abstract. Our beauty as a college is to use God's truth to make a difference in the lives of our students in both business and education.

COLLEGE of HEALTH PROFESSIONS

E ach of us has been made in God's image and likeness. We have each been given special gifts and talents, and in the College of Health Professions (COHP), we believe in the importance of being humble servants to our patients and clients. Just as the Lord demonstrated through His words and actions how to love thy neighbor and serve others, the departments within COHP strive to instill these same values and beliefs in those we train.

Whether it is assisting a patient with Parkinson's Disease to safely exercise, or teaching a child to communicate more clearly through speech, motivating a patient with a spinal cord injury to walk again, providing mobility by giving a person with a disability a wheelchair, or taking the time to thoroughly explain to a patient how their newly diagnosed disease can be managed, healthcare professionals are utilizing their Godgiven talents and serving others.

Additionally, providing school supplies, heading up the Thanksgiving food drive for families in need, and conducting a Health Fair for families at a local elementary school are tangible examples of helping our neighbors.

"Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms." 1 Peter 4:10

According to John MacArthur, truth is God's self-expression. Since God has made us in His image and likeness and given each of us specific gifts and talents, how we speak, think, and act on a moment-tomoment basis depicts whether we are rooted in God's moral character. As healthcare providers, our obligation is to put others first, to cause no harm, and to be servants. Abiding by these principles helps us "live the truth."

If the faculty and staff have done their job of serving as strong role models, then students will be prepared to step into the role as a professional and exhibit God's love with every person they meet. In healthcare, getting to personally know your patient/ client and working alongside them to meet their goals and objectives, demonstrating a compassionate and empathetic spirit, and offering words of encouragement and love are all means of sharing and showing one's faith.

Nearly every day, most healthcare professionals will share they witnessed a miracle. The deep satisfaction that arises from "helping" others brings tremendous joy and beauty to our work. HUE Menzies '87

Men's Soccer 1982-1985

Hue was a four-year letterman for the Cowboys and later served two years as the assistant coach.

He has 35 years of coaching experience, during which time he has produced over 600 players in college programs. He coached NY/NJ Gotham in the National Women's Soccer League. He also coached the Jamaican Women's National Team from 2014 to 2019.

Hue founded and directed the Lonestar Soccer Association in Austin, one of the top clubs in Texas. He has also coached in the Olympic Development Program on the national, state, and regional levels for over 15 years.

He was named CONCACAF Coach of the Year in 2018 and voted into the Black Soccer Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January of 2024.



LINDSEY

(Newcombe) Ackerman '11

Women's Basketball 2008-2011

Lindsey finished her career with 1,638 points, 1,283 rebounds, and 242 blocked shots, making her the all-time leader in rebounding and blocked shots at HSU.

She has the school non-scholarship era records for points in a game (38), rebounds in a game (23), field-goal percentage in a game (10-for-10), and blocked shots in a game (7).

Lindsey holds many accolades, including being twice named the American Southwest Conference player of the year, a first-team All-ASC selection, and a CoSIDA academic alldistrict selection.

She graduated with honors from HSU and went to nursing school. Lindsey has been a nurse and joined her sister, Angela, in New York City during the height of the pandemic to volunteer for the front lines.



Madison (Reyes) Ryals '13/'14

Volleyball 2009-2012

Madison never lost a match in the Mabee Complex.

She is the Cowgirls' all-time leader in kills, with 1,530 kills per set (3.42). While always a feared hitter with her athletic hammers from the outside and middle, Madison was an all-around player who never left the court.

She holds many honors, including a three-time all-region selection by the American Volleyball Coaches Association and being named an All-American and ASC MVP in 2011 and 2012. She was named ASC West freshman of the year and All-ASC West first team in 2009 and 2010. She was also named first-team All-ASC in 2011 and 2012.

She joins her father, Henry, as the first father-daughter combination in the HSU Athletics Hall of Fame.



SPENCE-SALAS '07/'09

Softball, Player and Coach 2005-2007, 2008-2010, 2013-2018

With her three seasons at HSU, Arin ranks first all-time in every major pitching category at HSU and is in the HSU top 10 in every single offensive and pitching category. She holds 25 school career records and 19 season records.

Arin led the Cowgirls to a record of 91-37. She helped lead the Cowgirls to their only two ASC titles in 2006 and 2007.

After her playing days, she completed her master's in sports and recreation management and served as a graduate assistant coach for the Cowgirls. Since then, she has coached at the high school level and then returned as head coach at HSU.

Arin joins her husband, David, as the first husband-wife tandem in the HSU Athletics Hall of Fame.

WELCOME RUSTY **OGLESBY**

Hardin-Simmons women's soccer program is under the new leadership of Rusty Oglesby '97, a former HSU All-American football player.

Oglesby, who was named to the Hardin-Simmons Football Hall of Honor in 2023, was a punter and kicker for the Cowboy football team under Coach Jimmie Keeling, H.D. '15.

In addition to his career as a football coach, Oglesby became one of the most respected high school soccer coaches in the state. So much so that he is currently serving as President of the United Soccer Coaches, the national association for coaches on all levels, which serves over 32,000 coaches.

As the Cowgirl program comes off another American Southwest Conference championship, Oglesby will join a team with a lot firepower for the 2024 season.

He says coming back to Hardin-Simmons was something God had His hands all over.

"When Marcus (Wood) left, I thought this was the opportunity. I had come to my 25 years of coaching on the high school level and thought this was a job that I would like and applied for it," said Oglesby. "Then I saw Lance (former Coach Lance Key) was in the running. I know Lance and we are good friends, so I pulled back."

Little did Oglesby know that the job would come open again two short years later, and again, he thought it was his chance.

"When I came in and sat with John Neese, who I had known since I was in high school when he was the sports reporter for KRBC, and then went to lunch with Dr. (Chris) McNair and Brad Bankhead, everything hit me. This is home. It's not about the buildings or the campus (which is beautiful and growing); it's the people."

Oglesby grew up in Abilene and always said he wouldn't go to college here. Then, God had other plans for him.

"Jimmie Keeling took the HSU job. I had been in the junior high football program in San Angelo

under him (before moving to Abilene), and he and Coach (Alan) Wartes convinced me this was where I needed to be. Little did I know then how right they were."

Hardin-Simmons is a big family and has always been that way. The connections and people you meet along the way have a way of showing up for you when you least expect it.

"God always has a plan. No matter the parameters you set and whatever the reasons, if He wants you to be somewhere, He will make that obvious and clear. That is what He did for me to return to Hardin-Simmons," said Oglesby. "I have two older and two younger kids. I want my younger kids to grow up in Abilene, around Hardin-Simmons. I am so happy to be home."



Patsy Bolin-HSU's Only Female Football Scholarship Recipient

hen asked to share an interesting fact about herself, Patsy Bolin's go-to response is that she went to college on a football scholarship. As expected, she's met with excitement and follow-up questions about what position she played.

Fluent in American Sign Language, Patsy (Rivers) Bolin '63 joined the team as an interpreter for Sammy Oates '62x, who played end (a blend of today's tight end, running back, and receiver) for the Cowboys. The role of interpreter was familiar to Patsy, as both of her parents were deaf. Listening to her family's radio when growing up, Patsy would translate the playby-play for her father, so this was not a new concept to Patsy.

"Sign Language was my first language," she shared. Even though Patsy is fluent in ASL and English, translating spoken words into signed words and vice versa is tedious. The jargon and nuance of football added a layer of difficulty to the task, but Patsy delivered.

Patsy and Sammy were both education majors. He sat next to her in class to copy notes, and later, they would debrief the content together. They had a great friendship during their time together at HSU, and, at times, Patsy was Sammy's wingwoman, helping him get dates.

After graduation, Patsy left the sports world and flourished in her gifts of ministry and creating community. She continues to sign at church today, makes resources available to those in the deaf community, and is responsible for bringing a deaf pastor to her former church (Legacy Drive Baptist Church, Plano, TX) to meet the congregation's needs. Patsy and her husband, Perry, have been members of Prestonwood Baptist Church in Plano since 2000, where she leads a Bible study for moms in various stages of life.

COACH'S FINAL INNING: A LEGEND RETIRES

All good things come to an end, and the retirement of Hardin-Simmons baseball coach Steve Coleman marks the conclusion of a remarkable era.

The 27-year head coach was a fixture in the Cowboys' dugout, the longest-tenured coach in the American Southwest Conference, and the school's all-time wins leader.

Coleman finished at HSU with a record of 569-539 and led the Cowboys to the postseason on 19 occasions.

"I came to Hardin-Simmons when I was 33 years old, and this university has been so good to me," said Coleman. "I have grown as a coach, leader, husband, parent, and now grandparent, and strengthened my walk with the Lord. The coach in me always wished we would have won a title or more games, but the most important thing to me is my lasting relationships with my players and coaches. Those are the things I cherish the most."

At HSU, he coached 105 all-conference players and seven All-Americans. His teams finished as the runner-up in the conference four times: in 2001, 2005, 2016, and 2023. They have always been competitive in the conference. His teams have produced a cumulative GPA of over 3.0 for the last 32 semesters, using a simple philosophy of if you can't do both, we will eliminate baseball from the equation.

"Coaching mentors have always told me that I would know when it was time to retire, and that time has come for me," said Coleman. "I will get to spend more time with my kids and grandkids, and I will be the number one fan of the Hardin-Simmons Cowboys. I won't miss 10-hour bus rides or throwing batting practice, but I will definitely miss being with the kids every day and impacting their lives, not just as baseball players but as young men trying to find their way in this world."

Coleman was able to coach his two sons, Chad '05/'17 and Brad '08/'10, at Hardin-Simmons, and they both still live in Abilene. Brad is married to Lori, and they have three children: Tucker (the HSU batboy) and twins Taylor and Tatum. His biggest supporter has been his wife, Lisa, the team mom who has sat in her lawn chair next to the dugout for all 27 years. Lisa's peanut butter and honey sandwiches she made in between games were legendary.

"I have to thank my family for always supporting me in this," said Coleman. "I also want to thank the Hunter family for all they have done for the program. I am also grateful for the coaches who have worked with us, especially Coach Brad Holcomb. We have had great administrative support. I think I was John Neese's first hire when he came on as athletic director, and he has had a great influence on my career."

Coleman had an immense impact on the baseball field. Anytime the Cowboys played in Austin, Dallas, or other places around the state, there would always be a flock of former Cowboys there to support the team and get together with their former teammates.

COLLEGE COURTS TO CHAMPIONSHIP COACHES

Kendra (Anderson) Whitehead '03 Hardin-Simmons Cowgirl basketball has a long and storied history and two of its successes showed that this past season.

Beth (Ulrickson) Jillson '02 and Kendra (Anderson) Whitehead '03 were Cowgirl basketball teammates for a couple of seasons in 2000 and 2001. They bonded as teammates under HSU Athletic Hall of Fame Coach Julie Goodenough.

Whitehead was a freshman, and Jillson was a transfer from Weatherford College. They immediately struck up a friendship because they had similar goals but different personalities.

"Beth is one of those personalities that makes everyone she sees feel special," said Whitehead. "I was more quiet and reserved. So Beth was always checking on me and seeing how I was doing. We were both new and nervous about how basketball would go and if we would be on varsity. But we became friends shooting for the same goal."

One theme that emerged from talking to Jillson, Whitehead, and Goodenough is that both Jillson and Whitehead had a strong desire to be champions on the court and in life.

"Beth and Kendra are both built with a main focus of being driven and working hard," said Goodenough. "You never had to worry if either of them was doing their summer workout or later on if they were messing around on the recruiting trail; they both were going to do the work necessary."

Hardin-Simmons' women's basketball won its eighth ASC Championship and second in three years with an 86-76 win over Mary Hardin-Baylor.

Both ended up on Goodenough's coaching staff at Oklahoma State and later Charleston Southern.

"We learned so much from Coach Goodenough, such as how to run a program and how to relate to people," said Jillson. "Hardin-Simmons is a wonderful place and was the right place for me at that time. I strengthened my walk with the Lord and developed into a more complete person. I also met my best friends in life. Kendra and Coach are both people I rely on heavily not only in basketball but also as mentors and friends."

Both Jillson and Whitehead have had great success. Jillson's Texas Woman's University team won the Lone Star Conference and advanced all the way to the Division II National Championship game in March. Whitehead won her second American Southwest Conference title and advanced to the Sweet 16 this year.

They do it in different ways. Jillson is more animated and emotional on the bench, and her teams play like that, while Whitehead is more reserved and her teams play with an intense focus.

"We coach differently and do things differently as far as strategy," said Whitehead, "If there is one thing I can identify, both of us really care about people. That is a key in our programs."

"I always want to win games; that's the competitor in me," said Jillson. "My biggest joy is seeing my players succeed on the court and then go out and succeed in life."

Their successes can undoubtedly be traced to the one that brought them together as teammates at Hardin-Simmons.

"Beth and Kendra are not just great basketball coaches, they are top-notch people as well," said Goodenough. "They are loyal, work hard, and their foundations are based on their belief in God. I am so proud of what they have accomplished and what they will accomplish in the future."



our work in METAL

The Engineering Department is proud to announce the continuation of its pioneering research project in metal additive manufacturing (AM), also known as metal 3D printing, in collaboration with Pantex, a National Nuclear Security Administration (NNSA) site under the Department of Energy (DOE). This significant research initiative, now entering its fourth phase, originally began six years ago and has been actively pursued at HSU since Dr. Matt Jackson, P.E, Dean of Holland School of Sciences and Mathematics, and Gabby Bognich, Director of Engineering Research, joined the university in 2022.

This image, which hangs in Ms. Bognich's office, is attached to the research work on metal AM. The research involves a laser bed powder fusion printer (a type of 3D printer) that takes powdered metal (stainless steel or titanium) and makes micro welds with a laser to create a unique final part.

"I wanted to try and take an image of an individual weld up close under a microscope," explained Ms. Bognich. "At the time, we didn't have a way to make a cross-section, so we just cut it with a chop saw. It burned through the part, which we did not mean for that to happen. But, it created this beautiful rainbow effect from the 'burn' that we captured using our Keyence microscope."

Engineering and art go hand in hand. Engineers are artists, but this picture reminds us that God is the true artist and designer.

President Bruntmyer received a letter last semester from Robert S. Black '50x who President Bruntmyer just had the privilege of meeting while in Houston.





SMITH SOCIETY: THOSE WHO GIVE \$1M IN A CALENDAR YEAR

Named for first BOT President, Rev. George W. Smith 1892-1899

On February 18, 1891, the Board of Trustees of Abilene Baptist College met in the office of the Reverend George W. Smith. According to Dr. Rupert Richardson '12/'42, "George W. Smith, more than any other person perhaps, is entitled to the designation of founder of the college," due to his work fundraising on behalf of the school. As the former pastor of the Abilene Baptist Church, Smith had no church under his care at this time; and the energy that he devoted to the cause probably was the determining factor that saved the school. He worked incessantly, reminded others of their obligations to the cause, and managed to speak life into the college. Smith, along with Dr. Owen C. Pope are responsible for bringing Dr. James B. Simmons into the conversation.



MERCHANT SOCIETY: THOSE WHO GIVE \$100K TO \$999K IN A CALENDAR YEAR

Named for second BOT President, C.W. Merchant 1900-1902

Claiborne Walker (C.W.) Merchant is responsible for naming the town Abilene "Abilene," after the cattle-shipping center in Kansas, and earned himself the nickname "Father of Abilene." He moved his family to Taylor County in 1882 and the following year constructed an elaborate rock house in the 1200 block of Merchant Street in Abilene. In May 1884, he was named president of the First National Bank of Abilene. He was director of the Abilene Central Railway in 1910 and president of the West Texas Fair in 1917. He advocated building better roads to aid farmers in transporting their produce and was supposedly the first to call these farm-tomarket roads. His success in the cattle industry enabled him to acquire vast ranch holdings in New Mexico and Arizona. Merchant was a deacon in the First Baptist Church and a trustee and benefactor of Simmons College (now Hardin-Simmons University).



LEGETT SOCIETY: THOSE WHO GIVE \$10K TO \$99K IN A CALENDAR YEAR

Named for third BOT President, Hon. K.K. Legett 1902-1910

HONORING DONORS

Kirvin Kade (K.K.) Legett was a civic leader, attorney, and rancher. When construction of the Texas and Pacific Railway out of Fort Worth was expected to go through Buffalo Gap but actually passed fifteen miles to the north, Legett joined those who moved from Buffalo Gap to the T&P tracks and founded Abilene in 1881. He participated in the first auction of town lots, made himself a leader in the community, and was soon looked upon by the local newspaper editor as "the most promising young lawyer in West Texas." He was later (1909) elected the first president of the Taylor County Bar Association.

Legett was one of the founders in 1891 of Simmons College (now Hardin-Simmons University). He wrote the school's first charter, served as a charter member of its Board of Trustees, and delivered its first commencement address.



PAXTON SOCIETY: THOSE WHO GIVE \$1K TO \$9K IN A CALENDAR YEAR

Named for fourth BOT President, George L. Paxton 1910-1913

The Kentucky native arrived in Abilene in 1889 and started out as a clerk in a hardware store that five years later he purchased. Shortly after the turn of the century, Paxton sold the hardware store and bought a controlling interest in Citizens National Bank, of which he was president of until shortly before he died. He was a longtime supporter of HSU and President of the Board of Trustees for multiple terms over 10 years. Several family members of Paxton attended HSU, including Mildred Paxton, first editor of the student newspaper, *The Brand*.

John's donor, Albert R. (Bert) Conly '48x, passed in 2017, so they could not connect, but his obituary shared his heart for HSU students:

"Sue and Bert wanted to make a difference for young people seeking an education and established the Conly Family Endowed Scholarship at Hardin-Simmons University. They enjoyed the letters from the scholarship recipients each year. The family requests that interested parties send memorials to the Conly Family Endowed Scholarship."

As a first-generation college student, John's mother was adamant that he attend college. Hailing from a small town with a graduating class of just twelve, college in the "big" city was an adjustment for John. His faculty, however, especially Dr. Jodie McGaughey and Dr. Charles Walts, were a huge encouragement for him. "They really looked out for me and really wanted me to succeed," he shared.

After graduating from HSU, John became a licensed CPA. COACH JIMMIE KEELING, H.D. '15

With God - All Things Are Possible

By his seventh grade year, Jimmie Keeling knew he wanted to become a coach. A football coach, to be exact.

As a young adult, Jimmie began his career coaching multiple sports at small Texas schools. After only four years, he became a head football coach at Dublin High School. In his second year as a novice head coach, his team achieved a 10-0 season and a district championship.

Coach Keeling later became the original head coach at Lubbock Estacado High School (LEHS)., the first fully integrated school in that city. He led them to a state championship in their initial UIL competition year. The life- and career-defining experiences at LEHS influenced his coaching thereafter.

After 35 years of coaching at nine high schools, Jimmie was presented with another life-changing opportunity.

Hardin-Simmons President Dr. Jesse Fletcher and Athletic Director Dr. Merlin Morrow asked him to become Head Football Coach and revive a dormant program. Through prayer, he became firmly convinced that HSU was where he needed to be at that exact time. Jimmie started in January 1990 and fielded a team with 119 players in September.

"I can honestly say I fell in love with HSU," he says. "I still love and believe in it today."

He retired following the 2010 season, having led the Cowboys to 11 national playoffs, either NAIA or NCAA Division III. His teams won three TIAA titles and seven ASC titles, posting an overall record of 172-53.

Coach Keeling values his 21-year tenure at HSU. Witnessing players complete schooling and achieve greatness in life remains a source of pride and joy.

Among his professional accolades is the Grant Teaff Lifetime Achievement Award conferred by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes in 2004.

In 2015, Hardin-Simmons conferred an Honorary Doctor of Laws degree upon Jimmie Keeling, recognizing his considerable impact on the university. He was elected as an HSU Trustee in 2016 and will complete his nine-year tenure at the end of 2024.

Dr. Keeling and his wife Susan, his best encourager and strongest supporter, are members of Abilene's Berry Lane Baptist Church where he is a deacon.

As a Trustee, Dr. Keeling joins other accomplished individuals in helping maintain HSU's excellence as an institution where students achieve academic goals and strengthen their faith.

"I firmly wish everyone in Abilene and West Texas realized how well Hardin-Simmons prepares young folks for life after college," Dr. Keeling says. "Our graduates go out and make a difference in the world."

DR. DARIN WOOD

Called to Serve God - Tried Relentlessly

Passing along the best advice he ever received, Dr. Darin Wood is fond of saying, "Choose faithfulness over success."

This first-generation college graduate holds a Ph.D. from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary (SWBTS) and shepherds First Baptist Church (FBC), Midland, Texas, as senior pastor. "I love church," he readily declares.

In February 2017, one year into his FBC Midland pastorate, Dr. Wood was diagnosed with stage 4 Non-Hodgkins Lymphoma. In 2016, the church had mourned the loss of long-time Music Minister Rev. George Koehl '78 to cancer. Less than a year later, Darin began his own journey through cancer treatments.

The recovery process was arduous, requiring perseverance and resilience. Today, he is a stronger husband, father, pastor, and friend. "I wouldn't go through that again for anything, but I wouldn't trade it away either," he says.

Darin's career in church work started early. He became a youth minister while still a sophomore at Dallas Baptist University. He graduated in 1990 and joined the Baptist General Convention of Texas's Youth-Led Revival program, eventually leading and expanding it.

Though not a Hardin-Simmons alumnus, the school holds a pivotal role in his life. Sent there in June 1993, as a BGCT employee, to help with Super Summer, he met his future wife, Julie Brown, an HSU student who went on to graduate in 1995. They married in May 2000, and she remains the cornerstone of his journey.

After earning his M.Div. from SWBTS, Darin served as a student pastor in Oklahoma. Encouraged to pursue a Ph.D., he thought a university professorship would be his career. Unexpectedly, in 1999 he found his true calling – that of pastor – while temporarily serving a small pastor-less church in Corsicana.

Dr. Wood was elected as an HSU Trustee in 2018. The launch of HSU's engineering program is an especially significant achievement during his tenure, he says, and the formation of the nursing school is equally exciting. Administrative excellence is notable, he points out, and reflective of the blessing of God's favor.

HSU feels like home, as it's where he found his "Fair Daughter of the West." Julie and Darin are proud parents of a young son, Josh.

"I love the passion our faculty has for HSU and its students, and wish people knew the joy and investment these amazing people give to their students," Dr. Wood says. "We often focus too much on the cost of private education and not enough on the benefits it provides. HSU is a great example of the benefits!"



JOHN G. HARDIN SOCIETY Remembering Dorinne (Rister) Glenn '44



orinne (Rister) Glenn graduated from Hardin-Simmons University in 1944. Coming from a large farming family, funds were tight. Dorinne's father brought her to Hardin-Simmons to meet with the President who told them, "If Dorinne wants to attend, I will find a way for her to do so." Living up to the motto, "Cowboys find a way," he arranged for Dorinne to work her way through college while living with the HSU librarian, who quickly became her respected mentor.

During WWII, Dorinne enlisted in the Navy WAVES and rose to the rank of Yeoman 3rd class. When James Glenn, the son of her father's farm hand, was discharged from the Navy, they married on Christmas Eve in 1945, just three months after the end of the war. In addition to earning her second degree at the University of Texas and attending graduate school at Texas A&M, Dorinne and James adopted an infant son and three sisters before learning that Dorinne was pregnant. After their children left home, James and Dorinne thanked God for their blessings and committed to giving away everything "over what was enough." Dorinne lived to the "ripe old age" of 102 ½ and even into her 90s, she continued to give her time and talents through a "banana bread ministry" to the "shut-ins" from her church.

Hardin-Simmons University is blessed to be the beneficiary of a trust set up by John G. Hardin Society member, Dorrine (Rister) Glenn, in the amount of \$119,000.





DR. EDMUND "ED" DEATON '50 B.A.

Ed Deaton lived a long and extraordinary life that began in a small town in east Texas in 1930. At HSU, he played in and loved the "World-Famous" Cowboy Band. He was the oldest Cowboy Band alumnus to attend their 100th Anniversary Celebration in 2023, traveling with his daughter Dr. Janice Deaton from San Diego, California.

Dr. Deaton earned his Ph.D. in math from the University of Texas and began teaching at San Diego State University in 1960 where he remained until retiring in 1992. In 1996, he began teaching for the University of Maryland in Heidelburg, Germany. In the years following, he also taught in England, Italy, and Spain. He retired again in 2008. He loved to travel and visited 85 countries where he toured, trekked, or rock climbed. He especially loved Nepal, making 16 trips there.

From his sophomore year until graduating from HSU, Al was pastor of Medicine Mound Baptist Church which left no time for involvement in extracurricular activities on campus. After all, it was the late '40s and early '50s when cars and roads made for very slow travel compared to modern times. This would be the first of several churches Al pastored before beginning his second career in education. He taught high school in New Mexico, served as Registrar at Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU), and was Director of the Baptist Student Union and Professor of Religion at ENMU.





n 1964, H.S. "Higg" Higginbotham and Lynn Lee sat down at the Walgreens soda fountain and went to work naming their newly acquired Ford Dealership. They settled on the name Arrow and for 60 years Arrow Ford has been a staple of the Abilene community.

Throughout Arrow's history, a pattern has revealed itself. About every decade, Arrow undergoes some sort of renovation or addition. In 1974, Arrow celebrated its ten-year anniversary and moved into its current location at 4001 S. 1st Street. Rather than doing a re-model in the 80s, Higg's son, Seaton, established Arrow's Loan Arranger in 1987, offering financing to those the banks wouldn't help. Two years later, Arrow added Mitsubishi to its line of vehicles.

By the mid-90s, Arrow had adopted the slogan The Right Choice, and it was time once again to remodel the dealership, creating a finance and delivery showroom where customers could drive their new vehicle off the showroom floor.

In the new millennia, Seaton and the Arrow team weathered the storm during The Great Recession of 2009 in which Chrysler declared bankruptcy and terminated, without cause, 800 dealers, including Arrow Chrysler Jeep. The entire Arrow staff joined together to rebuild the organization and create Raving Fans by identifying customers' needs and satisfying them completely.

Another new decade spelled a new generation of leadership at Arrow Ford. Seaton promoted his daughter, Shanna Kevil, to General Manager and Trennon Cauthen to Comptroller. Arrow celebrated its 50th anniversary on June 4, 2014, and



embarked on the third renovation of its South First locale. Arrow's commitment to employee well-being paid off big in 2017, when Arrow Ford was awarded the prestigious "Small Employer of the Year" award by the Texas Workforce

Commission. This recognition, along with the opening of Arrow's on-site child recreation program, I Can Kids, in December of 2019, solidified their dedication to creating a supportive and familyoriented environment, attracting and retaining top talent in the competitive automotive industry.

Despite an ever-changing environment, Arrow continued to evolve to better serve its guests. Steadfast to Higg's philosophy of providing affordable pre-owned vehicles in convenient locations, Arrow opened Arrow Point Auto Mall in 2021 to cater to its South Abilene neighbors. Arrow Point revitalized a long-vacant building into an auto dealership of the new age with nods to history including a classic car collection and antique post office display.

Building upon their customer-centric philosophy, Arrow launched the Arrow for Life loyalty program. As Arrow for Life grew, it quickly became clear that Arrow would need to expand its workforce and footprint to provide quality experiences for its service guests. Facing a national shortage of automotive technicians and limited training resources in the Big Country, Arrow took on the challenge to grow talent locally and established Arrow Academy in 2022. Simultaneously, Arrow embarked on planning a major renovation of its service department. Doubling the current capacity, incorporating state-of-the-art equipment and a fully airconditioned facility, the upgrades promise faster turnaround times and an elevated experience for staff and guests alike.

By 2024, construction was well underway on the multi-milliondollar renovation and on June 4, 2024, Arrow Ford celebrated its 60th year of service to Abilene and the Big Country. Reflecting on the past 60 years and looking forward to the future, Arrow Ford's story continues to unfold, woven with threads of resilience, innovation, and unwavering dedication to family, community, and the ever-evolving world of the automotive industry. From its humble beginnings to its dynamic present, Arrow stands as a symbol of Abilene's spirit, forever etching its legacy on the Big Country landscape.
